## General Meeting March 2nd 7:30 pm Western Foundation

Jeff Sikich is a National Park Service wildlife biologist and world-renowned tracker. International government agencies and non-profit groups have enlisted him to tag dangerous carnivores in order to better understand the behaviors of threatened species. For the past decade he has been in the Santa Monica Mountains studying the impact of dense human population, highways and urban sprawl on our mountain lions. Jeff will discuss this research and answer questions.

## Conservation by Dee Lyon

Why are there so many birders?

The advent of field guides, the development of better and less expensive binoculars, a greater interest in nature and deeper concern for the environment have all contributed to the expansion of birdwatching.

There are the casual, the committed and the expert. It is amazing that in a survey one in four Americans questioned said they did some bird watching over a two year period. It is estimated that two million Americans are committed birders, knowing a hundred or more species. The super-committed read their field guides from cover to cover, do some bird watching several days a week and keep records of sightings.

When asked why they observe birds, most spoke of the beauty of birds and wanting to be close to nature. Birding can be a particularly intense personal experience producing a joyful awareness.

In one study the average bird watcher age was 42. 70% were male. They were typically of above average income and education.

It's best if a birder starts as a child.

California and Florida have the most species of birds. It has been said that if a birder stays in California long enough, that person will see almost every migrant species in North America.

### **Sunday, March 8<sup>th</sup> Cheseboro Canyon**

The gently rounded hills and canyons of Cheseboro and Palo Comado are older than the steeper, more recently formed Santa Monica Mountains and provide popular terrain for hikers, bikers and equestrians. For over 150 years ranchers made these canyons their home. Many of the native plants, poorly adapted to heavy grazing, were replaced with European annuals such as wild oats, mustard and thistle. Despite numerous years of cattle grazing, we can still find a variety of native plant communities, including chaparral, coastal sage scrub and riparian woodlands. In these communities we will find native residents and migrants. Directions: Take the Cheseboro exit from US 101 and head north on Palo Camado Canyon Road. Turn right onto Cheseboro Canyon Road and park either at the first or second parking lots, depending on availability. The group will meet at the second parking lot at 8 am. ### **Sunday, March 15 Lake Los Carneros**

We will spend most of the day at Lake Los Carneros in Goleta, looking for waterfowl, finches, sparrows and chaparral species. Expected birds include Gadwall, Cinnamon Teal, Redhead, White-tailed Kite, Mew Gull, Belted Kingfisher, Loggerhead Shrike, Hutton's Vireo, gnatcatchers, swallows, sparrows and more. Lake Los Carneros

is best accessed off North La Patera Lane in Golita. Directions: Take the 101 North and exit at Fairview Avenue. Turn right and then turn left on Calle Real. Turn right on La Patera Lane and park near the trailhead entrance to the park and lake. Meet at Las Posas Park and Ride to carpool at 7:00 am or at Lake Los Carneros at 8 am. ### **Saturday, March 21 Ventura County Game Preserve**

Just in time for early spring migrants, the game preserve has generously opened their private grounds for our group. Please use good birding etiquette... you must remain with the group at all times! On past trips we have seen species such as Vermillion Flycatcher, Marsh Wren, Northern Harrier, Peregrine Falcon and American Bittern. Since we cannot drive the grounds there will be considerable walking (about 2 miles total). Directions: Take Casper Rd. south from Hueneme Rd (between Saviers Rd. and Hwy 1). Follow the left curve to the barn and house and park on the road adjacent to these buildings. Please bring scopes, binoculars and field guides. Time is 8:30. Trip leader: Neil Zeigler (805) 983-7207

### **Sunday, March 29 Rancho Sierra Vista**

We expect to see orioles, hummingbirds, swallows and more at this great park. In the grassland that remains after the devastating fire of May 2013, we should be able to find gnatcatchers, Black-headed Grosbeak and California Thrasher. Historically, this park has hosted up to eight species of flycatcher, four species of woodpecker, five species of hummingbird, seven species of raptor and twelve species of sparrow at this time of year. Will they all be there this year? Help us answer that question and upload your findings to eBird to contribute to citizen science efforts. Directions: From the 101 exit Wendy Drive and head south. Turn right on Lynn Road. Lynn Road soon becomes Potrero Road. Turn left on Via Goleta and head to the end of the road and meet in the parking lot at 8 am. Trip leader: Linda Easter (805) 482-7537
