## SHARE THE JOURNEY By Carol Langford

Conejo Valley Audubon Society was founded in 1968 in Thousand Oaks as a chapter of the National Audubon Society. Even though we are relative youngsters we'll celebrate our 40th birthday with cake at our September meeting. And we are mighty pleased to be around to celebrate this birthday!

The history of the National Audubon Society can be traced back to 1886 when George Grinnell started a campaign to stop the unmitigated slaughter of birds, primarily egrets for their feathers. National Audubon was incorporated in 1905 with conservation efforts continuing resulting in federal and state laws prohibiting "plume hunting". The Migratory Bird Treaty signed by President Woodrow Wilson in 1918 was an early conservation success.

When Frank Chapman proposed the first Christmas Bird Count in 1900 as an alternative to the Christmas hunt he started a tradition which became part of the Audubon tradition of involving ordinary people in the science of birds. In 1900 there were CBC observers in 25 locations. On December 21, 1974 at its first Christmas Bird Count CVAS had 36 observers in the field. Among the 146 species on that first count were 1200 Tri-colored Blackbirds, one Green-tailed Towhee and one Northern Goshawk.

## FIELD TRIP REPORTS

### ARIZONA 2008 Trip Report

The star of the trip was the FLAME COLORED TANAGER, which I believe was a new bird for everyone! We eventually saw close to 100 species.

All 14 of us gathered at Santa Rita Lodge in Madera Canyon at dusk on Friday, May 2<sup>nd</sup>, when the Elf Owl came to the edge of his hole and couldn't believe the crowd of about 30 people watching for him.

We had wonderful looks at both Elegant Trogans nesting near the trail. It's always a treat to see the Magnificent, Violet Crowned, Broad-tailed, Broad Billed, Black-chinned and Anna's hummingbirds. There were Arizona, Acorn and Gila Woodpeckers, Vermilion Flycatchers, Thick-billed Kingbirds, Plumbeous Vireos, Bell's Vireos, Vaux Swift, a Northern Pygmy Owl calling, and Wild Turkeys in several places, with good looks at a Gray Hawk. White-winged Doves were everywhere as well as some Inca and Common Ground Doves. We all liked the Bridled Titmouse, and got used to saying Grey-breasted Jay. We saw Curve-billed Thrashers, Black-throated Sparrow, Painted Redstarts, Western, Flame-colored, Summer and Hepatic Tanagers; Canyon, Green-tailed and Abert's Towhee; Lazuli Bunting, Northern Cardinal; Hooded, Bullocks, and Scott's Orioles; Pyrrholoxia, Dusky-capped Flycatcher, Cactus and Canyon Wren; and Mexican Duck, among other wonderful birds. Our route began at Madera Canyon: then on to the Roadside stop in Patagonia; then to the Patton's, and the Preserve; on to Sierra Vista with most of us going into Ft. Huachuca and Garden Canyon; then on to the San Pedro River.

### “INTRODUCTION TO ORNITHOLOGY” CLASS TO BE OFFERED SEPTEMBER 15 - NOVEMBER 21, 2008

Each year is interesting, with 15 Varied Thrush present in 1978, then only one in five different years, but none since 1996. Clark's Nutcrackers made an appearance only once, in 1996, although something was going on that year as 58 Red Crossbills were also found. One Crossbill was seen in 2004 but no more Clark's Nutcrackers. The Great Backyard Bird Count was initiated in 1998 by National Audubon and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology as another project in the arena of "citizen science". This count provides a snapshot of bird populations in February, just before the spring migration. E-bird, the latest of the citizen science projects, offers the opportunity for each of us to enter our sightings all year long into an online database.

While National Audubon and Conejo Valley Audubon have seen many changes during the years, both continue to promote a culture of conservation and science by connecting people with nature. Please join us in September as we celebrate our 40 years of conservation, citizen science and getting together with friends who enjoy birds.
