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scientific information. However, changes in attitudes and probably the school budget mean there will be no TREE program at Sequoia Middle School next year.

FIELD TRIP REPORTS

Sisar Canyon **Saturday, April 11** *by Rich Congersky*

A small group of seven met on Saturday the 11th at Sisar Canyon. It was a brisk, beautiful morning in the canyon with clear blue skies and the sound of the stream bubbling beside us. We saw 36 species overall. We started our morning at the water tanks with a California Thrasher, California Quail, California Towhee, Acorn Woodpeckers and a Red Shafted Flicker. As we headed up the trail into the canyon we encountered, Junco's, Anna's and Black Chinned Hummingbirds, American & Lesser Goldfinches, White Crowned Sparrows, Bushtits, Band Tailed Pigeons, Mourning & Eurasian Collared Doves, Oak Titmouse, Turkey Vultures, American Crows, Raven, Brewer's Blackbirds, Starlings, Red Tailed hawks, Spotted Towhee, House Finch, Hooded Orioles and Nuttall's Woodpecker. Highlights of the day included, Hutton's and Warbling Vireo, Nashville, Orange-Crowned, Black-Throated Grey, Townsend's and Yellow Warblers, Hermit Thrush and House Wren. A great day was had by all!

Sierra Vista **Saturday, April 18** *by Thelma Williams*

A great group of enthusiastic birders spent a beautiful morning at Sierra Vista-Satwiwa on April 18th. We were treated to 42 species, many of them the first looks of the season for most of the participants.

We had great looks at Lazuli Bunting, Blue Grosbeak, Western Bluebirds, Black-headed Grosbeaks, Anna's, Black-chinned and Costa's Hummingbirds, White-tailed Kite, American Kestrel, Red-shouldered and Red-tailed Hawk, Cooper's Hawk, Northern Harrier, Cassin's and Western Kingbird, Ash-throated Flycatcher, Bullock's and Hooded Oriole, House Finch, American and Lesser Goldfinches, Wrentit, House wren, California and Spotted Towhee, Nuttall's Woodpeckers, Starlings and Oak Titmouse all nesting in holes in one tree by the office, Cliff Swallows nesting, Black and Say's Phoebe, Bushtit, Song Sparrows, Northern Mockingbird, Mourning Dove, American Crow,

Raven, Western Scrub Jay, Brown-headed Cowbird, and Pied-billed Grebe, Mallards, and Greater Yellowlegs in the pond on the way out. It was a delightful day for all.

BUTTERBREDT SPRINGS **Saturday / Sunday, May 2 / 3** *by Dee Lyon*

An epic weekend at one of the most celebrated birding spots in Southern California! John Pavelko, Babette Lawall, Bets Buchanan, Ron Barns and Dee Lyon were the lucky five to hit a spectacular migration. As Ron put it, "This is like High Island" which is huge, don't know which birds to look at. Must have been hundreds of Wilson's Warblers, big numbers of Warbling Vireos, Hermit Thrushes, Black-headed Grosbeaks, and a terrific variety of flycatchers.

Common Yellowthroat, Yellow, McGillivrays, Nashville, Townsends, Wilson's, Orange-crowned, Yellow-rumped and Lucy's Warblers, Yellow-breasted Chat, White-crowned, Golden-crowned, Savannah (gorgeous with big yellow eyebrow), Lark, Sage, Lincoln's, Chipping Sparrows, Red-tailed Hawk, Amer. Kestrel, CA Quail, Mourning Dove, Band-tailed Pigeon. The stars of the show were the 2 Great Horned Owls with 2 young! Vaux's Swift, Anna's, Costas and Rufous Hummingbirds, Ladder-backed and Acorn Woodpeckers, Cassin's Kingbird, Ash-throated and Dusky-capped Flycatcher, Olive-sided Flycatcher, Western Wood-Pewee, Black and Say's Phoebe, Gray, Dusky, Hammond's, Willow and Pacific Crest Flycatchers, Tree Swallows, American Crow, Common Raven, Red-breasted Nuthatch, House, Rock and Bewick's Wren, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, Hermit Thrush, CA Thrasher, Cassin's, Warbling and Hutton's Vireos, Lazuli Bunting, Red-winged and Brewer's Blackbird, Brown-headed Cowbird, Bullock's Oriole, Western Tanager, Lesser and Lawrence's Goldfinch, Purple, Cassin's and House Finch and House Sparrow. To this list add Green-tailed Towhee and CA Towhee, making 70 species in all!

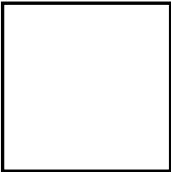

This photo of three baby hawks was taken in San Diego using a Canon EOS digital camera through a Celestron 11-inch diameter telescope. The nest is in the top of a giant pine tree at a distance of approximately 100 yards.
